NATIONAL LANDSCAPE PROSPECTUS

Recommendation

1. The Committee is recommended to note and comment on the prospectus.

Background

2. The National Landscape prospectus (see Appendix 1 which will be emailed separately) has been produced by the National Association for AONBs (NAAONB) as part of a discussion within the family about what reform and renewal of AONBs could look like and how to get there. It builds on the NAAONB's response to the Landscapes Review and the ensuing government consultation, as well as incorporating the results of discussions that have been held more recently.

3. In responding to the Landscapes Review, and in how they have approached the process, Defra appear to have considered each of the proposals almost in isolation. The purpose of the prospectus is to demonstrate that when the various threads of the reform proposals are pulled together, then a powerful 'big idea' emerges - the potential to create a landscape designation by design, fit for the future but built on the learning and legacy of AONBs.

4. It is hoped that a compelling narrative which pulls these threads together will maintain momentum and enthusiasm for the reform that has been pursued and will make it less likely that some aspects are dropped.

5. This prospectus has very recently been sent to the Secretary of State for the Environment and to shadow Secretaries of State. It is felt that making a positive play for the role of AONBs and the work of their partnerships is perhaps especially important at the current time; given uncertainty around funding and policy reforms.

REVIEW OF 2019-24 AONB MANAGEMENT PLAN

Recommendation

- 1. The Committee is recommended to:
 - a) Approve the principle of delaying a substantive Management Plan review for one year
 - b) Approve the indicative revised schedule for AONB Management Plan production
 - c) Having previously reacquainted themselves with the current AONB Management Plan, to highlight and discuss any specific issues that it wishes to raise which could be included in one page of text setting out its intentions for the next Management Plan, in particular concerning:
 - A vision
 - A Management Plan Structure
 - Partnership Objectives

Background

2. The current Malvern Hills AONB Management Plan was adopted in March 2019. There is a legal requirement to review and have an updated plan published within five years, meaning that a revised plan would normally need to be in place by end of March 2024.

3. However, there has been widespread change since 2018/19 and the scale and scope of the rapidly evolving legislative, policy and management framework for AONBs has significant implications for protected landscape management planning at this time. A revised plan to meet the normal timetable risks being substantively adrift from the principal legislative and policy drivers anticipated over the next 12-18 month period. In the wording of the Countryside and Rights of Way Act it is therefore not considered expedient to review the AONB Management Plan at this time.

Option of delaying a substantive review

4. Defra have confirmed (see Letter from Lord Benyon, Appendix 1 to this item) that our Partnership has the option to delay publication of the AONB Management Plan by up to one year from the original planned review date

5. The purpose of this optional delay is to give Partnerships time to digest new outcome-based targets (due to be published in January 2023), new Management Plan guidance (due to be published in Spring 2023), and Landscapes Review developments, and to embed these more easily into their Plans. Delay of up to a year would also provide some additional time to account for possible slippage of these publication dates.

6. Defra considers that that any Partnerships wishing to utilise the option of delaying a substantive review will still need to undertake a very light touch review to ensure compliance with the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000, but will not need to consult extensively. Partnerships could simply agree and publish Malvern Hills AONB Partnership Committee papers and text that sets out their intentions for the next Management Plan and that the current plan period will be extended.

7. A review of this nature would allow Partnerships to carry over their existing Management Plan by demonstrating they have considered the next Plan in compliance with the law. Support for this approach would be required from all five Local Authorities with responsibility for the Malvern Hills AONB, along with sign-off in accordance with decision-making procedures for each Council.

8. Around 20 other AONB Partnerships are broadly aligned with the same Management Plan cycle as the Malvern Hills AONB with many indicating that they also wish to delay their substantive reviews by a year.

Rationale

9. In the absence of a definitive and detailed government response to proposals made by the Landscapes Review, a one year delay will enable alignment of a substantive Management Plan review with the development and publication of key drivers including:

- Significant changes to the purposes of designation for England's protected landscapes
- New guidance on the structure and production of strengthened protected landscape Management Plans.
- New Strategy for England's protected landscapes.
- An outcomes framework for protected landscapes to include new targets and monitoring requirements.
- Establishment of a new National Landscapes, Parks and Trails Partnership and AONB branding changes • completion of a review of options for AONB governance.
- A refreshed 25 year Environment Plan.
- Planning reform.
- Development of Local Nature Recovery Strategies and exploration of links with the AONB Nature Recovery Plan.
- Further development and roll-out of new funding mechanisms for environmental management and nature recovery including: Environmental Land Management, Biodiversity Net Gain, Carbon credits and other forms of natural capital financing.
- AONB management role in delivering Environment Act 2021 and Net Zero Strategy requirements.

10. In particular, the publication or substantive iteration of the first four bulleted items are seen as an in-combination trigger point. When reached, this would enable meaningful progression of a Management Plan review.

Proposed timetable

11. The route to adoption of this very light touch review, effectively delaying a substantive review by one year, will differ by local authority. This could be a delegated decision that falls under the schemes of delegation for each Council. However, this requires confirmation from each Council.

12. The subsequent substantive review to produce a 2025-2030 AONB Management Plan would likely revert to requiring a more rigorous local authority approval process.

Dear colleagues,

I am writing to confirm a decision by Defra, effective today, to give you and your partners an option to delay the publication of upcoming Management Plans by up to 1 year from their original planned review date, after new Management Plan guidance and new Protected Landscapes outcomes are published.

I am addressing this letter specifically to those Protected Landscape Management Plan Partnerships (hereafter: "Partnerships") that are required by law to review their next Management Plan in 2023 or 2024. For awareness, I have copied this letter to Protected Landscapes bodies who will not be affected by this option to delay and can proceed with their current review timetable as planned.

Please allow me to explain the rationale for this, and to reassure you that you are under no obligation to delay the publication of your next Management Plan if you would prefer not to and/or if a delay is unsuited to your management planning cycle.

The government committed to strengthen Management Plans in its <u>response to the</u> <u>Landscapes Review</u>. We have already begun work to implement non-legislative change during 2022. For example, we are working with Natural England, National Parks England, and the National Association of AONBs to update the Management Plan guidance for both National Parks and AONBs. We are also working to ensure that new ambitious outcomes are agreed for the role of Protected Landscapes in delivering on the government's goals, aligned with the revised 25 Year Environment Plan and interim environmental targets under the Environment Act 2021 and the Net Zero Strategy.

We recognise the scale and significant implications of these reforms for management planning. We have also listened carefully to those of you who have voiced support for a more flexible and less prescriptive approach to management planning during our consultation on the Landscapes Review Response, which ended on 9 April.

We have therefore decided to grant you an option to delay publication of your next Management Plan. In practice, this option to delay will only apply to Partnerships that are required by law to review their next Management Plan in 2023 or 2024 and will therefore apply to Partnerships who currently find themselves in the middle or nearing the end of their five-year Management Plan cycle. Protected Landscapes that are due to publish their next Management Plan from 2025 onwards will not be affected by the delay and will work to the same timelines as planned.



The purpose of this optional delay is to give Partnerships time to digest new outcome-based targets (due to be published in January 2023), new Management Plan guidance (due to be published in Spring 2023), and new policies outlined in the government's response to the Landscapes Review, and to embed these more easily into their Plans.

Defra considers that that any Partnerships wishing to delay their next Plan would still need to respect their five-year review cycles as stipulated by the Environment Act 1995 (for National Park Management Plans) and the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 (for AONB Management Plans). In order to comply with the law without compromising the integrity of future Management Plans, Defra judges that Partnerships could simply produce a light-touch review in which they commit to produce a new Management Plan after the new guidance is published.

Defra has considered what a light-touch review might look like and advises the following: Partnerships would agree and publish one page of text setting out their intentions for the next Management Plan. This could include a brief vision statement, a summary of how the Management Plan will be structured, and a summary of the Partnerships' objectives over the next five-year review period (carrying forward actions and/or adding new ones for the year affected by the delay). Producing a light-touch review of this nature would allow Partnerships to carry over their existing Plan by demonstrating they have considered the next Plan, in compliance with the law. Partnerships would not need to consult extensively to produce this light-touch review, as we expect it would be pitched as a continuation/extension of the current Plan.

We remain committed, however, to ensuring substantive Management Plan reviews are conducted. We therefore ask all Protected Landscapes electing to delay their next Management Plan to complete a review of that Plan no later than 31 December 2025. We will consider any requests for an additional, exceptional extension on a case-by-case basis. Although we are committed to ensuring the management planning process is more flexible going forwards, we envisage this being a one-off delay in light of the wide-ranging and significant reforms we are proposing to make.

Let me be clear that any Plans that have recently been published will remain valid and effective for their current cycle in full (that is, five years from the date of publication). We recognise the considerable work that has gone into these Plans and want to assure you that any new targets, guidance, or policies can be embedded at a later stage, either during your current cycle or as part of the next five-year review.

Once again, I would like to reassure you that this delay is optional; it is entirely up to you, as Partnerships, whether to exercise it.

I hope that this option to delay can help to ensure a smooth and flexible transition as we roll out reforms to strengthen Management Plans. As we begin this process of longer-term reforms to Management Plans, we would like to explore how we can better harmonise Management Plan cycles so that we can promote partnership working and coordination of plan implementation across the 44 Protected Landscapes, while respecting local circumstances. I look forward to your input as we develop this work.

Management Plans are vital strategic documents and I am grateful for your tireless work to draft, develop and deliver them. My officials and I look forward to continuing to work with you on multiple programmes of work linked to Management Plans, including updating the new Management Plan guidance, setting new targets for Protected Landscapes, and developing the National Landscapes Partnership and the National Landscapes Strategy.



I would be grateful if you could share this letter among your Partnerships and wider networks to ensure they are informed.

I have also copied this letter to Tony Juniper, Chair of Natural England, Philip Hygate, Chair of the National Association of AONBs, and Andrew McCloy, Chair of National Parks England.

FARMING IN PROTECTED LANDSCAPES UPDATE

Recommendation

- 1. The Committee is recommended to:
 - a) Note the report; and
 - b) Raise and discuss any issues arising.

Background

2. Defra's Farming in Protected Landscapes (FiPL) programme was launched in early July 2021. The programme forms part of the Agricultural Transition Plan (published on 30 November 2020), with funding available for all English National Parks and AONBs across 3 financial years, from 2021–2024.

Funding and Expenditure

- 5. In the first financial year of FiPL (2021–22), the Malvern Hills AONB was awarded, following reallocation, **£90,000.45**. The breakdown of this expenditure was as follows:
 - Project Grants: £72,265.53
 - Advice and Guidance: £15,425.08
 - Administration: £2,332.6
- 6. Total Spend for the period was £90,014.21 (an overspend of £13.76)
- 7. <u>For the 2022–23 Financial Year</u>, the grant amount awarded is **£236,538**. At present, the following amounts have been allocated and/or spent:
 - Project Grants: £144,758
 - Advice and Guidance, and Administration Combined: £31,030
- 8. Remaining available spend for the 2022/23 FY (to include Projects, Admin and A&G): **£60,750**

- 9. For the 2023 24 Financial Year, the expected grant amount is **£198,027.** At present, the following amounts have been allocated:
 - Project Grants: £15,655
- 10. Remaining available spend for the 2023/24 FY (to include Projects, Admin and A&G): **£182,372**

Staffing and financing staff time

11.Sash Warden is still in position as Farming in Protected Landscapes (FiPL) Officer, working on both Advice and Guidance, and Administration aspects of the scheme.

Grant assessment:

- 12. In the 2021–22 FY, a total of 5 panel meetings were held, the first meeting of which was an introductory meeting.
- 13. So far, in the 2022–23 FY, three panel meetings have been held, with a fourth meeting planned to be held on 3 November 2022.
- 14.A total of 17 of the 22 FiPL projects have been approved by the Local Assessment Panel in the above panel meetings, with Paul Esrich as AONB Unit Manager approving 5 of the projects that were below the £5,000 panel threshold.

Inquiries

15. There have been further inquiries with regards to FiPL. Some of the inquiries have unfortunately been a substantial distance outside of the AONB, or the interest has been more suited to other Schemes (i.e., Farming Transformation Fund). Since the last JAC Meeting there have been a further 12 enquiries, with 9 of these turning into FiPL Projects, either approved or being constructed.

Applications

- 16. Between the expenditure in Year One, and allocations for Years Two and Three of FiPL, £232,679.85 has been put towards grant funding in the Malvern Hills AONB.
- 17.12 projects were approved in Year One of FiPL, with 10 projects being approved so far in this 2022 23 FY.
- 18. Moving forwards there are 9 projects currently in the pipeline for either this current FY or to be spread over the 2023 2024 FY.

19. A breakdown of the Projects may be seen below in the table below.

2022–23 - Issues

- 20. The extremely dry weather of the summer has meant a significant amount of watering has been required on trees that were planted as part of orchard projects in the winter of 2021-22. However, with thanks to Colwall Orchard Group, it is believed that only 2 of these trees were lost over the hot weather period.
- 21. There are at least two potential projects which involve building ponds; regrettably these projects have stalled due to issues relating to the complexity and time involved in securing planning permission. The AONB Unit is still looking to move forwards with these projects if possible
- 22. Project MH013 The Brush Seed Harvester, has been a great success in the 2022 summer, harvesting 150+kg of Meadow seed from three sites in and around the Malvern Hills AONB. It is estimated that the market value of this seed is probably equivalent to the cost of the harvester. Two of the harvested sites were SSSIs and all the seed will go towards projects listed below in Table 1. With thanks to both the Worcestershire County Council Green Space Team, Worcestershire Wildlife Trust, and Private Landowners for their help with the harvesting and storage of seed.

Dance Film

We ran a fully-booked premiere of the modern dance film created over lock down, that showed the healing virtues of the Malvern landscape. It will be shown at the Exeter Dance International Film Festival in October.

NAAONB conference

In September AONB staff attended the national AONB conference, whose theme was diversity and inclusivity. We are now taking up the challenge of making our activities, communications and groups more accessible to a wider range of people. We hope to commission desk research shortly to find out both who does and who doesn't currently engage with the AONB, before beginning activities and conversations to find out more about how we can be more accessible.
