Ranking of Libraries by Deprivation Levels in Catchment Area

The latest Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) remains 2019's (an update is due once a central government consultation about the data-set has been completed). The 2019 data-set showed Worcestershire having 74 Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) in the top 30% most deprived in the country, up from 68 in 2015's summary. There are two more LSOAs in the country in the top 10% most deprived areas compared with 2015's data.

- Upton now has an LSOA in its catchment area that is in the most deprived 30% of areas. As it has only 3 LSOAs nine of which were previously identified as deprived, in 2019's IMD analysis, 33% of the catchment area of the library is classified as deprived.
- Bromsgrove library catchment areas has two extra LSOAs in the top 30% most deprived areas in the county compared to the 2015 data. This brings the total number of Bromsgrove's LSOAs in that category to 4.
- The catchment areas of Kidderminster and Redditch each have one extra LSOA in the most deprived 30% of areas compared to the 2015 data. These are two large catchment areas that have a relatively high proportion (over 30%) of LSOAs in the top 3 deciles and have already been identified as more deprived.
- Droitwich has one extra LSOA. 15% of its catchment-area LSOAs are classed as deprived (2015: 10%).
- The Hive has one less LSOA classed as deprived in the catchment area.
- Warndon and Woodrow have small catchment areas with 100% of their LSOAs classified as deprived areas. They also each have one more LSOA in the very top decile, i.e. the top 10% most-deprived areas

Service Isolation (proximity to other libraries)

The proximity of each library to other libraries or library links in the County in terms of both distance in miles, travel times and access to public transport is an indicator of its relative isolation and the accessibility of alternative library service provision for its customers. The table below ranks libraries by distance to the nearest library or library link, setting out distance and travel time from the closest service point. The more isolated a library is, the higher its ranking.

Appendix 1, Table 2: Isolation Ranking.

Each library's overall isolation score is the sum of its journey distance ranking, car journey time rank, public transport journey time ranking, and rank in respect of the number of public transport services.

- The availability of public transport, specifically bus services, is subject to change pending the outcome of discussions between the County Council and service providers over funding for rural, lae-night, and weekend services.
- The most geographically isolated library is Tenbury, which is 14.4 miles from the nearest Worcestershire library (Bewdley)
- Malvern, Upton, Martley, and Broadway are the next most isolated service points, located between 6 and 7.5 miles from the nearest Library and with poorer public transport links.
- St John's, The Hive, Catshill, Bromsgrove, Woodrow and Redditch libraries are the least isolated libraries, located within 2 miles of another Worcestershire Library.

A number of Worcestershire libraries situated close to the County's borders are located close to out-of-county libraries. The above ranking does not include an adjustment to reflect proximity of Worcestershire libraries to out-of-county libraries as it cannot be assumed that library provision in other authorities will remain unchanged.

Exclusive use of Home Site library

The proportion of active library users, who use their home site library exclusively, is an indicator of the relative need of that particular library for its local population. This indicator varies significantly across libraries and reveals substantial variations in patterns of local customer behaviours that may be attributable to a range of factors including geographical isolation and ease of access to transport as well as the level of local library service provision. The higher the proportion of home-site-only active users, the higher the ranking.

- The five highest levels of exclusive Home Site users are found in Wythall, Hagley, Tenbury, The Hive and Evesham libraries. Wythall is the only library at which the figure is in excess of 90%.
- Woodrow has seen a marked drop in its percentage of Home Site Only users, dropping from 81.6% in the 2018/2019 financial year to 58.1% in the year ending 31st January 2023.
- As in 2018/2019, the lowest levels of exclusive home site use in the twelve months to 31st January 2023 are found in Warndon, Catshill, and St John's.
- 54.2% of users of the Library Link at Martley use only that location; Welland's equivalent percentage is exactly 50%.

Library Activity

Library activity levels indicate the relative need of each library in terms of the extent to which a range of library services are used by the population. They provide a measure of the reach of each library.

Library performance indicators for the year 1st February 2022 to 31st January 2023 inclusive have been used to provide a measure of the amount of participation in seven areas of library service provision at each library:

- 1. Number of library visits
- 2. Number of active users (borrowers and computer users)
- 3. Visits, issues, new members, and event attendees in the year from 1st February 2022 to 31st January 2023 inclusive as percentages of the equivalent totals in the same periods in 2019/2020 (pre-COVID-19) and 2021/2022. This is included as a means of monitoring libraries' progress in recovering from the pandemic.
- 4. Number of library issues
- 5. Number of library computer sessions
- 6. Number of event attendees
- 7. Number of adult learners

An overall ranking of libraries by library activity has been produced by combining the ranking scores for each area of library service provision. This is set out in the table below.

- The Hive, which has the longest opening hours and the most comprehensive service offer, is the most-used library, with the County's five other main libraries ranked immediately below The Hive.
- The two locations with the lowest levels of activity are the Library Links at Welland and Martley, which provide a minimum service offer and have the fewest opening hours.
- Broadway, Warndon, Catshill, and Upton have the lowest overall activity levels, if the Library Links are set aside.

6.5 Overall Ranking

Having ranked libraries according to each of the 4 indicators of need for library services, an overall ranking of need can be achieved by adding the 4 component scores together and ranking the libraries again in order of their aggregate score. The higher the overall ranking, the greater the overall need.

The table below shows the final ranking of libraries from 1 (greatest aggregate need) to 23 (least aggregate need).

- The five libraries with the highest aggregate need are Malvern, Evesham, Kidderminster, Redditch, and The
 Hive. These libraries have high levels of service activity and high proportions of Home Site Only users as well
 as mid- to high-level deprivation.
- Tenbury's geographical isolation places it in the ten libraries with highest aggregate need
- Woodrow overall ranking is now 16th, compared with 10th in 2018/2019. This is mainly due to a decline in Home Site only users and its proximity via car and bus to Redditch Library, the frequency of services into Redditch having not been affected by recent reductions in bus services elsewhere in the county.
- As in 2018/2019, the five libraries with the lowest aggregate need are Bewdley, Broadway, Warndon, St John's, and Catshill.
- Apart from Warndon, those five libraries on the whole have low levels of deprivation, service activity, and home-site only users. In the case of St John's and Warndon, very close proximity to The Hive is a factor in the relatively low proportion of Home Site Only users.
- Fully volunteer-run Library Links at Welland and Martley have low aggregate need for similar reasons.
- Bromsgrove, the main library for Bromsgrove District, has moved up the rankings from 16th in 2018/2019 to joint-9th. Despite relatively high levels of service activity, it does not feature higher in the list due to its close proximity to two other Worcestershire libraries (Catshill and Rubery) and its mid-level ranking of deprivation and Home Site Only users.
